Why do emotions matter? Scholars from manifold disciplines dedicate their research to this question. Focusing on the Humanities the research of emotions has become a widely expanding and highly productive subfield. In the last decade a variety of different approaches has been developed. The workshop seeks to bring together positions elaborated in History and Sociology in order to initialise an interdisciplinary dialogue. As disciplines of the Social Sciences, both History and Sociology are deeply interconnected. Therefore the aim of the workshop is to elaborate the links as well as the limitations of the interdisciplinary discussion. As a general introduction to the topic, three talks will concentrate on theories of emotions from a historical and sociological perspective. In the second part of the workshop participants are invited to contemplate the relevance of theories and methods of emotions in their particular field of research and to discuss why emotions could matter.

The workshop should be of particular interest to PhD students and is open to any person concerned in this field of study.
